- 3 Taking into consideration the unacceptable conditions in many prisons of the world,
- 4 Realizing that most of the prisoners worldwide suffer from bad hygiene,
- 5 Noting with regret that education is not being offered in all prisons, especially to teenagers,
- 6 Expecting to provide acceptable basic needs for all prisoners,
- 7 Alarmed by the bad provision of healthcare,
- 8 Deeply disturbed by the ignored problem of not separating male and female prisoners,
- 9 Concerned about corrupt prison employees,
- 10 Having examined the tendency of the bad working conditions,
- 11 Pointing out the present cases of torture in many prisons around the world,
- 12 **1.** Recommends all nations, especially the MEDCs, to help founding a National Prison Hygiene and Education Control Agency (NPHECA) which controls:
- 14 a. hygiene in prisons,
- b. regular education classes,
- 16 c. the content of the educational classes;
- **2. Seeks** to encourage prisoners to participate in programs, such as:
- 19 a. different kinds of sports,
- 20 b. basic education,
- c. therapies,

- d. re-socializing classes for reintegration into society;
- **3.** <u>Calls for regular assemblies of NPHECA in order to:</u>
- a. update the programs,
- 26 b. measure the progress of the prisoners;

27 **4. Proposes** to improve the hygiene by: 28 a. separating the toilets from the cells, 29 b. providing disinfectant, 30 c. access to showers; 31 32 **5. Further requests** to optimize the basic needs of prisoners by: 33 a. an acceptable accommodation, 34 b. providing clean drinking water, 35 c. providing enough food; 36 37 6. Proclaims to improve the bad provision of healthcare by regular visits of doctors; 38 39 7. Encourages a reform of the judicial system in order to accelerate the judgment of cases and avoid unnecessary waiting time in the cells; 40 41 42 8. Reminds that the prisoners should benefit from the same working standards as any other 43 human being; 44 45 9. Resolves to improve the prison management systems in order to prevent torture and other 46 inhuman practices by: 47 a. Reforming the often outdated national legislation and rules relating to the management of 48 prisons, 49 b. Developing training programs for prisons managers to improve their leadership role and staff to 50 apply international standards and norms in their daily practice, 51 c. Making sure that the prison authorities take care of the supervision and treatment of prisoners 52 is in line with the rule of law, with respect to individual human rights, and that the period of 53 imprisonment is used to prepare individuals for life outside prison following release; 54 55 10. Calls upon the developed countries to create an international fund which: 56 a. helps developing countries to improve the conditions of prisoners, such as accommodation, medical service and education, 57 58 b. provides personal support, such as administrative specialists and engineers, 59 c. is used to build additional prisons to deal with overcrowding; 60 61 11. Strongly encourages the separation of male and female prisoners to 62 a. prevent reproduction, 63 b. sexual abuse; 64

65 12. Strongly urges to combat corruption inside prisons through 66

a. Better working conditions for the officers,

b. Stronger punishments for corruption;

67 68 **13.** Recommends that all these rights should also apply to the pre-trial detainees;

14. <u>Supports</u> any further ideas which can be helpful in the problem-solving process.
