# New Countries, New Conflicts?

How does one react to an unexpected event such as a new state appearing and how does one secure delegates in danger? These are the tasks the delegates and chairs of the Security Council were confronted with yesterday.

The usual committee session of the Security Council was interrupted abruptly. The observer of Turkey was taken into custody by two armed security men. A few moments later, the delegates had to leave the room, outside of the committee several cars were waiting for them - to bring them to a secret place: The Gut Wahnbek. Escorted by a police car and an ambulance, five cars made up the convoy. The surprising situation and the tension were easily noticeable - the appeal to stay calm and quiet was given as the delegates were getting out of the cars. When the evacuation was completed, a video was shown in the committee where two representatives of a new and independent Kurdish state, who could pose an urgent danger for the present delegates stated the independency of a Kurdish state in the Northern region of Syria near the Turkish border and demanded equality and acceptance for all Kurdish people. It turned out that the Turkish observer was a spy who monitored the committee for the rebels. Therefore it was essential to categorize the situation as urgent and evacuate all present members

of the security council to entertain a crisis session.

Fortunately, the security guards were able to react and execute the emergency plan which included the journey to the location half an hour away from the Edith-Russ-Haus.

Troubled and alarmed the delegates discussed the establishment of a no-fly-zone for civil aviation to the affected areas. The delegation of China made very clear that they would support such a measure.

Their statement included the expression of the fact that all fifteen members of the Security Council would cooperate during the session and agree on useful steps in order to resolve the conflict.

Russia was against the resolution and tried to prevent that determination from being enforced. Finally all concerned nations agreed on the decision.

During the debates the question

"Are the Kurdish forces able to defend themselves?" appeared. Russia pointed out several times that it is the right of states to defend themselves if necessary and also proposed to support them with military forces. Also controversial was the role of the United Nations and which position they should take.

Point after point was discussed and either passed or failed.

The USA emphasized their wish for a peaceful solution and condemned the use of violence. Intensive discussions and long debates lead to a shortage of time and put a lot of pressure on the delegates. Because of this it was decided to vote on only the last three points of the resolution. All in all the extraordinary session of the Security Council was successful and the delegates were able to return to the Edith-Russ-Haus safely.

Just a few minutes after arriving at the train station Simon Conrad, the guest speaker from Princeton University, held an interesting speech about the conflict between Sunni and Shia Muslims. In his speech he summed up the causes and consequences of the disagreement between the two branches, provided helpful information to the committee and also suggested some potential solutions to the problem.

In our interview he further elaborated on these topica that "the trigger was obviously the US invasion of Iraq and the Arab Spring". In his opinion it is mainly about "the influence of governments wanting to push through with their interests." As for the development of the conflict in the near future Simon Conrad pointed out that the identities of Sunni and Shia Muslims "were created, which means that it is not something natural." He fears that we are at the point where those identities have

He chose this education, as it was an opportunity for him to "never do math again", but also get to know a new religion.

As his wish has always been to become a diplomat our next question got an extensive answer. Our question about what Simon Conrad would do if he was in a leading position of a country involved in the conflict got the following as a response: In his opinion "the problem is that Iran and Saudi Arabia are fighting about superior strength in the government and that both parties are large political actors. He remarked that the conflict is being fueled by states using the religious narratives. His own attempt at solving the problem? Try to enter into a relationship with the other country, a relationship that has nothing to do with religion to create a dependence. It is important to encourage people to engage in low-level partnerships as an example to others. To do so is the right way to solve the disagreement, Simon Conrad says.
