The Oldenburg Model United Nations Conference is probably one of the best organized school events of the year. The Secretariat of the OLMUN 2019 consists of five experienced students, chosen from different schools.

They were elected by the OLMUN association's general assembly, which normally meets right after the school year begins. The members of the Secretariat are usually recruited from the ranks of former Chairs, Presidents and Student Officers. Their tasks include, as already mentioned, making sure that everything that has been planned by the organization team goes smoothly and without any problems, as well as managing the expenditures.

This year, the Secretary-General position is filled by the 18-year-old Hedda Spengemann from the Integrierte Gesamtschule Flötenteich (IGS). Interview with: The Team behind the new OLMUN App



How long did it take you to complete the app?

We worked on the app for about half a year. The app available today is version 2019.7.52, so as you can see, we developed a lot of versions because there was always something to improve and to change.

Who came up with the idea?

The first time we talked about an app for OLMUN was in the beginning of the preparation for OLMUN 2018, when we were both Secretary Generals. We developed a small and

very easy-to-use app with a modular construction system, but we were not completely happy and satisfied with that. So during the preparation of OLMUN 2019, we started developing and programming a totally new app all by ourselves.

What was your intention when you developed the App?

We were talking about the 2018 version of our app and even though it worked great, we agreed that its features were not really tailored for the

OLMUN. As Alexander started studying computer science, he decided to use his already acquired knowledge to create an app that fits the delegates' needs perfectly.

What was the hardest feature to program?

The ability to use the app offline. We felt that it was a very important feature, therefore we invested a lot of time into it. However, as a user, you will not recognize how much work went into this technical issue. A feature that was very labor-intensive and that you are actually going to use a lot was the newspaper section.

More Activities to Come!

OLMUN, which was established in 2001, has grown considerably to Europe's largest Model United Nations conference organized by students only. A remarkable journey, considering that 19 years ago a group of students around Gero Elerd started this conference with just a handful of delegates from Oldenburg.

Today, OLMUN is organized by a group of sixty students, called the 'Inner Circle' and the 'Secretariat', consisting of five students (Hedda, Amelie, Dennis, Rasmus and Anita).

In this year's session, we welcome about 1000 participants from different nations like the United States, Canada, Zimbabwe, Mexico and the

Czech Republic. Our committee locations are spread out all over the city of Oldenburg. In total, ten committees are simulated and all of them have a guest speaker, who will provide background information on the respective topic.

In order to cover all the costs associated with such a large-scale event, every student who takes part as a delegate pays a participation fee. In addition to that, OLMUN is sponsored by companies based in Oldenburg and around, covering costs of 35,000 to 40,000€.

We are a non-profit organisation, so we use every cent of sponsoring and fees for paying venues, conference

material, copies and all other costs. Without this support, it would not be possible to create a conference of these dimensions.

During OLMUN, a lot of activities are offered, in which all participants have the chance to meet students from all over the world.

Moving Beyond Borders?

Borders still matter around the world for all the wrong reasons

Travel just 80km west from Oldenburg and you will find yourself peacefully crossing into the Netherlands. The border is barely noticeable – roads, cycling paths and public transport continue without interruption. For the people in this region, crossing an international border is daily business.

Considering that the situation has been like this all over Europe since the Schengen Agreement of 1985, borders play a surprisingly important role in the political and social discussion in Europe. A generalised fear and hatred of anything ‘foreign’ have resurged in recent years, driven by far-right populist parties that benefit from voters’ fears for their own future. More shockingly, such openly racist attitudes become more socially acceptable as mainstream political parties adopt them, hoping to increase their approval ratings. Some politicians now openly question the EU itself and all its achievements – including borders that have not been closed for decades.

The consequences of this are blindingly obvious, yet often ignored. More than 2000 people died while attempting to cross the Mediterranean Sea in 2018. In Germany, as well as all over Europe, xenophobic at-

tacks and hate crimes are on the rise. Being foreign, a migrant or a refugee should never mean having to fear for one’s safety, not to mention for one’s acceptance in a society that has profited from its international openness for decades.

Mainstream politicians have seemingly decided to tolerate racist and chauvinistic attitudes and to play into the far-right’s hands by adopting a discourse that brings borders back into the collective imagination. We should have moved beyond this small-minded distinction by now. Migrants have brought and continue to bring wealth to their communities; not one of the topics on OLMUN’s agenda can be solved without international cooperation. Not to mention the joys of intercultural exchanges – anyone who has tried *stroopwafels* (or met a charming Dutch person) will agree that the Dutch-German border should never be closed again. It is up to all of us to broaden our horizons and to make sure that borders do not prevent the progress of humankind. Let’s hope that OLMUN 2019 gives all of us an opportunity to contribute to this effort.

Interview Baart von Donselaar



Bart van Donselaar is President of the Historical Security Council and an experienced OLMUN veteran.

This is your third consecutive OLMUN. Why are you coming back every year?

My school went to this conference every year until last year. I knew there would always be people that I know enjoying the fun that MUNs bring. Even now that I am enrolled in a university, I came back because it is always an amazing experience, and because of the friends that I made here!

What is the biggest challenge when chairing a committee like HSC?

The Historical Security Council is special in two ways. Firstly, the SC is the only organ of the UN that gives veto-powers to five countries that also have permanent seats in the council. This makes getting to a solution that pleases everyone extra important, as just one ‘no’ can mean the end of a lot of hard work. Secondly, the HSC is set in the past, meaning that the decisions made here could lead to a vastly different outcome from what happened in the real world.

If you are hungry, **Woyton** is a good choice. At Woyton you will get 10% discount on bagels, salads, coffee and more.

Need Vitamins? **Vitamina** is the place to go! Fresh juices, milkshakes and other dairy foods are available for 10% less the usual price.

If it is hot outside, **San Marco** will provide you with delicious, refreshing ice cream. You will get 10% off of everything.

For eating pizza, the **Trattoria** is a nice option. You can eat there or take your pizza to go and pay 50 cents less.

Finally, the last and probably most special thing to do: 3D-blacklight minigolf is a very fun activity, offered in not too many places.


