3 Recalling that police and other law enforcement officials play a vital role in the protection of the right to life, liberty, and security of person, and in serving the community and protecting 4 5 all individuals against acts of torture and other cruel, inhumane, or degrading treatment or 6 punishment 7 8 Acknowledging that in the performance of their duties, law enforcement officials are 9 obligated to respect and protect the human rights of all persons and 10 11 Pointing out the essential need to build trust with the public they serve, as well as the 12 essential need to have the efforts reciprocated, 13 14 Guided by the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which declares that all human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights, and that everyone is entitled to all the 15 16 Declaration's rights and freedoms, regardless of race, color, or country of origin, 17 Convinced that public confidence in police and other law enforcement officials is paramount 18 for their ability to perform their functions effectively and depends on, inter alia, their respect 19 20 for the human rights, fundamental freedoms, and human dignity of all persons, 21 22 Recalling the relevant General Assembly resolutions, especially Assembly resolutions 74/137 of December 18, 2019, and 43/1 of June 17, 2020, and the critical necessity for their full and 23 24 effective enforcement, 25 Recognizing that there is space for improvements in examining training manuals 26 and instructions of law enforcement officials and the proportionality of measures applied in the 27 28 management of suspects and other individuals in custody, particularly with regard to the 29 treatment of minorities such as people of color, 30 31 1. Strongly condemns every type of discrimination and violent action of law enforcement against minority groups, as well as the systemic racism that pervades 32 the criminal justice system: 33 34 2. <u>Affirms</u> to amending the Code of Criminal Procedure to explicitly prohibit 35 discrimination in identity checks, and to limit police authority so that stops are based 36 on objective and individualized suspicions through regulations such as but not limited 37 38 to; 39 a. The right for people to seek court orders to stop police departments

from discriminatory profiling.

43		avoid prejudicial discrimination,
44		c. Requiring officers to increase their transparency when in duty through means
45		such as;
46		i. establishing objective justification for making a stop and to report every
47		stop including location, race, gender, whether force was used and
48		whether a firearm was found;

50	3.	Recommends police departments to ban chokeholds, and use lethal force only as a
51		last choice when efforts at de-escalation - the intentional slowing down of an incident
52		to provide police more time, distance, and space to peacefully settle conflict -
53		have failed;
54		
55	4.	Invites all Member States to provide training, technical assistance, and research, all
56		with the aim of creating a police culture in which officers routinely intervene as
57		necessary to prevent misconduct, avoid police mistakes, promote public health and
58		wellness through means such as;
59		a. Equipping officers with the skills they need to safely intervene before
60		problems occur/escalate,
61		b. Supplying officers with means to help them make ethical decisions,
62		c. Providing trainings which emphasize communication skills and methods for
63		recognizing and de-escalating potentially violent situations and to use lethal
64		force only as a last choice;
65		d. Equipping the police with utilities such as body cameras - which will be turned
66		off only by asking for approval from supervisors - and easily visible
67		identification numbers to provide concrete evidence of the use of excessive
68		force and unjust practices;

70	5.	Requests establishing an independent international commission of inquiry, to be
71		appointed by the President of the Human Rights Council, whose
72		mandates should be;
73		a. Observing law enforcement agencies' responses to peaceful protests,
74		including the alleged use of excessive force against protesters,
75		bystanders, or journalists;
76		b. Establishing the facts and circumstances relating to systemic racism, alleged
77		violations of international human rights law and abuses against people of
78		color, minorities, people with disabilities and other individual differences in the
79		parts of the world recently affected by human right violations at the hand
80		of law enforcement agencies,
81		c. Examining and reporting on possibilities of non-binding guidelines by which
82		law enforcement agencies could abide by to eradicate systematic human
83		rights abuse;

85	6.	Calls upon all Member States that are affected, all United Nations
86		bodies and relevant parties to cooperate fully with the commission of inquiry, and to
87		facilitate its access;
88		
89	7.	Urges the assistance of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights in
90		this regard, including in the provision of all administrative, technical, and logistical
91		assistance required to enable the commission of inquiry to fulfil its mandate promptly
92		and efficiently;

94	8. Suggests allocating funding to organizations which occupy themselves
95	regarding protecting and preventing victims of human rights violation by law
96	enforcement officers;

98	9. <u>Requests</u> effective human rights training to be part of police education to
99	improve officer's human rights cognition and performance ability by
100	a. increasing the number of questions regarding human rights protection in the
101	tests which officers must take before getting hired or promoted;
102	<ul> <li>Including psychological behavioral tests alongside to psychological behaviora</li> </ul>
103	training on how to deal with escalating situations without the need of
104	using excessive force;

106	10. <u>Requests</u> that trust should continue to be placed in the state organs of those states
107	which are committed to Human Rights.
