- 1 The United Nations Human Rights Council,
- 3 Acknowledges the prevalent issue of human trafficking across the globe,
- 5 Recognizes the root causes of human trafficking and modern slavery worldwide,
- Alarmed by the lack of action on part of countries suffering from human trafficking and modern
  slavery,
- 10 Respects the individual culture, religion, and way of life of individual countries,
  - 1. <u>Strongly urges</u> all governments to acknowledge slavery and human trafficking as a severe violation of human rights with laws:
    - a. combating human trafficking and modern slavery,
    - b. prohibiting human trafficking and modern slavery,
    - c. prosecuting human traffickers;
  - **2.** <u>Encourages</u> national lawfully acknowledged definitions of human trafficking and Modern Slavery to:
    - a. define these terms nationally for citizens to comprehend the relevant dimensions,
    - b. make laws enforced more heavily;
  - 3. <u>Calls for stricter enforcement of laws against traffickers by setting higher penalties by:</u>
    - a. enhancing international cooperation and information sharing among countries to tackle transnational trafficking networks,
    - b. providing support and protection for witnesses and victims during legal proceedings to ensure their safety and facilitate their cooperation;
  - **4.** <u>Suggests</u> national human rights institutions working independently (NGO) to promote and protect Human Rights by:
    - a. establishing specialized support services and shelters to provide immediate assistance, protection, and rehabilitation for victims,

34 b. offering comprehensive psychosocial support, medical care, and legal aid to help 35 victims recover and reintegrate into society, c. educating through the measures mentioned in clause, 36 d. collaborating with local and international organizations to ensure coordinated 37 efforts in identifying, rescuing, and supporting victims of forced labour, forced 38 39 prostitution and forced marriage; 40 5. Supports national education of human rights, to prevent modern slavery and human 41 trafficking by making citizens less vulnerable, by: 42 a. making citizens aware of: 43 i. possible frauds or/and dangers, 44 ii. safety measures, 45 b. making immigrants aware of: 46 i. the aforementioned points in 4a, 47 ii. the rights granted within respective countries, 48 c. encouraging the founding of education programs/websites issuing modern 49 slavery and human trafficking in different languages, to achieve a bigger reach 50 and thus make sure every citizen, even of different origin, has the ability to 51 educate themselves of: 52 i. safety measures, 53 ii. the rights of the countries they are living in, 54 d. sending educational teams to implement the aforementioned programs, 55 e. providing high-quality early education and invest in customized support 56 especially for women and children, 57 f. introducing courses for self-defence and places where people can seek shelter or 58 59 accommodation, 60 g. assisting children, women, and men by supporting to respect and protect the obligation of all state powers, regardless of whether they are legislative, 61 executive or judiciary, 62 h. specifically addressing previous victims, and their current situations through 63 sharing stories; 64 65

- **6.** <u>Facilitates</u> international dialogues based upon the principles of mutual respect among Member States, to:
  - a. prevent illegal recruitment of labour, by enabling safe, orderly, and regular migration:
    - by cross-border human trafficking in order to detect the establishment and leader of criminal organization by monitoring the routes of human trafficking,
    - ii. through conduct international raids with this leader of criminal organizations acting in different countries can be arrested,
  - b. stop the immigration of criminals executing human trafficking into states which citizens are kidnaped by these by increasing border control between severely affected countries:

98		poverty, famine, lack of resources, or complicated political issues used for:

112		b. treating men not only as perpetrators but as individuals of equal value.
