The Special Conference, 1 2 Alarmed by the brutality of former imperial countries against native people and the economic 3 4 exploitation of the African continent, 5 Deploring cultures and religions have been scaled down or demolished through colonialism as 6 well as the millennia of culture in Africa that was disregarded by the Europeans, 7 8 Declaring that the mass killings of the native people conducted by the imperial powers were 9 genocides, 10 11 Acknowledging actions in the past regarding the disregard of territorial borders as well as state 12 sovereignty, violations of human rights in the course of colonial crimes as well as resulting 13 obligations, 14 15 Noting with regret that many items were stolen by colonial forces during their rules of the 16 colonies and are now located in foreign museums, 17 18 Emphasising the achieved and still existing wealth of the countries that colonised others, 19 20 Realizing the development delay to the suppression of the imperial powers and its long-term 21 effects on the functionality of the governments. 22 23 24 Deeply disturbed by the African continent's continuing experience of intense agricultural, 25 mineral, and maritime exploitation by the former imperial countries, 26 Further recalling the impact of the ongoing climate crisis that is mostly caused by former 27 imperial and rich countries but affects former colonised and poor countries the most, 28 29 Welcoming current steps in the form of Resolution 73/295 and Article 73 of the UN Charta and 30 Article 5 of the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial 31 Discrimination, 32

Aware of the need to take further such steps to create a just, balanced, and stable partnershipand world order,

- 1. <u>Accepts</u> the obligations to fight inequality and injustice resulting from the actions in the past regarding colonialism as well as the need for social healing in the former colonies;
- 2. <u>Urges</u> more countries to officially apologize for these actions;

3. Calls for the restitution of stolen artefacts to the country of their origin;

4. <u>Strongly urges</u> to counter injustice in the form of racism and social problems through reforming the current system and amendment of racist laws to create structures where all are treated equally;

5. <u>Supports</u> the political dialogue between former imperial countries and their former colonies about reparations for colonial era wrongs and the damage resulting from these actions to create a form of social healing;

6. Endorses the fight against corruption in every country as well clear rules where the money from the reparations may be used;

7. <u>Recommends</u> all nations to support the creation of an Independent Commission on Colonial Exploitation in Africa (ICCEA) which:

a. consists of experts from African states and former imperial countries,

 b. assesses the economic, cultural, social and developmental consequences of colonialism in Africa in the past and today,

 c. identifies and documents specific cases of human right abuses committed during the colonial era,

d. examines the role and responsibility of former countries in the process of colonialisation and their obligations towards reparations and restorative justice,

e. supervise the return of looted art,

 f. is authorised to impose and enforce the return of stolen art from foreign museums or galleries, if necessary;

 8. <u>Suggests</u> education about colonialism through anti-racist and anti-colonialism initiatives in the areas of school education, media and politics;

9. Encourages to improve education in the former colonies by funding und supporting the educational system to ensure the development of the future youth of the former colonies;

10. <u>Demands</u> former imperial countries to help with already happening crises caused by global warming and take action fighting climate change to prevent more crises and damage of agriculture and infrastructure;

- 11. Asks the former imperial countries to:
 - a. acknowledge the murder of the native people a genocide,
