Resolution adopted by Historical Security Council on 18 June 2026

Discussing the ongoing Military Escalation and Creation of a long-lasting Peace Framework in the Middle East (The Six-Day War, 1967)

The (Historical) United Nations Security Council,

Afirming that neither military action nor threats of force can provide a long-lasting solution to ongoing conflicts in the Middle East,

Bearing in mind that Israel and Jordan operate well within their water allocation limits set by the Jordan Valley Unified Water Plan in 1955,

Recalling military skirmishes which have occurred between Syria and Israel in November 1964 around Israel's National Water Carrier works,

Alarmed by the withdrawal of the United Nations Emergency Force from the Sinai Peninsula, Deeply concerned by ongoing Egyptian troop movements on the Sinai Peninsula,

Having received the complaint of the representative of the United Arab Republic in a letter to the President of the Security Council dated May 27, 1967,

Recognizing the humanitarian and financial challenges which arise in Palestinian refugee camps,

1. **Recommends** all Member States to support diplomatic efforts to resolve this situation peacefully;
2. **Strongly urges** the Secretary-General to appoint a special envoy to facilitate negotiations between Israel and its Arab neighbors, which shall aim to find an agreement on permanent recognized borders in the Middle East;
3. **Authorizes** the creation of the International Water Committee (IWC) with its main purpose of enforcing and mandating the Jordan Valley Unified Water Plan;
4. **Encourages** the establishment of temporary United Nations observed demilitarized zone which will
 - (a) extend five kilometers in both directions starting at the Armistice Lines of 1949 creating a zone ten kilometers wide,
 - (b) be reviewed by the Security Council,
 - (c) can be dismissed by a mandate of the Security Council, once a permanent border has been agreed on;

5. **Further Request** to reiterate a possible two-state solution regarding Israel and Palestine;
6. **Requests** the Secretary General to prepare a report on measures that could reduce tensions in Jerusalem and protect access to holy sites, without linking such measures to any recognition of permanent borders;
7. **Strongly affirms** that Israel as well as their Arab neighbors have the right to exist within new secured and internationally recognized borders;
8. **Expresses its hope** for long-lasting peace and political stability in the Middle East.
